

## Welcome to Narrowsburg! Now, take a hike...

**The Tusten Trail** is a relatively flat, casual 2.5-mile walk through historic downtown Narrowsburg. This trail begins at the DEC River Access on DeMauro Lane.

**Humphrey's Road** runs parallel to the Delaware River and a set of aged train tracks leading out of Narrowsburg. This idyllic road is perfect for a stroll under shady trees. Take Route 97 north and you'll find Humphrey's Road on the left, just after the big bend.

**Brook Road** is light on traffic noise, yet loud with warbling from the nearby East Branch of the Ten-Mile River. This road offers a beautiful divergence from Route 97 into a dense, thriving forest, and opens up to Route 23 on the other side.

**Ten Mile River Road (A-Road)** runs parallel to the Ten Mile River, and includes a time-honored stone-arch bridge. This path intertwines natural beauty with history. This dirt road runs between Route 97 and Crawford Road, just east of the NPS Ten Mile River Access.

**Tusten Mountain Trail (Yellow Dot Trail)** is a moderately difficult three-mile hike. It features the rocky remains of the original Tusten Settlement, and opens to a lovely vista. Head south on Route 97 and turn right onto Crawford Road. Head down the hill to the confluence of the Ten Mile and the Delaware, park in the parking lot, and follow the yellow dots blazes.

**Damascus Forest Trail** is a short, tranquil trail that features a landscape of wetlands scattered with old-growth trees. To find the trail, head across the Narrowsburg bridge and turn left onto River Road. Take the first left onto MacCubbins Road and travel .6 miles to the parking lot on your right.

**Bouchoux Trail (Jensen's Ledges)** is a half-hour drive from Narrowsburg. A somewhat difficult, yet short hike will lead to a panoramic, astounding view of the river. To find the trail in Lordville, NY, turn onto Bouchoux Rd. off of 97 and go about three miles. The trailhead is on the left at the end of the cul-de-sac.
